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# THE REPRODUCTIVE JUSTICE MOVEMENT

Definition: "The human right to control our sexuality, our gender, our work, and our reproduction. That right can only be achieved when all women and girls have the complete economic, social, and political power and resources to make healthy decisions about our bodies, our families, and our communities in all areas of our lives."

In 1994, twelve Black Women gathered and through their collective wisdom and resistance a seed was planted. A direct action on August 9, 1994 - where nearly 800 Black women signed a call out of Congress on healthcare reform birthed the term Reproductive Justice. This direct action shifted the culture and laid the foundation for a new framework that ignited a movement. Ultimately, we are working to secure our human right to make our own decisions about our bodies, our families, and our futures.

## Foreword I

In Tennessee, the situation is especially alarming.

- Maternal mortality rates have doubled from 15.5 deaths per 100,000 live births in 2013 to a distressing 29.4 deaths per 100,000 live births in 2020, as the Tennessee Department of Health reported.
- The 2023 MMR Report stated that In 2021, 134 women in Tennessee died while pregnant or within one year of pregnancy. 7 in 10 (70%) pregnancy- associated deaths were deemed preventable. MMRC noted several contributing factors to deaths including substance use disorder (45%), mental health conditions (31%), discrimination (22%) and obesity (21%).
- Women with lower socioeconomic status often face complex health, medical, and mental health needs and are at higher risk for poor pregnancy outcomes. Most pregnancy associated deaths (71%) occurred in women who had TennCare/Medicaid at delivery.
- Almost half (49%) of women who died from pregnancy-related causes had TennCare at delivery. (2022 Maternal Mortality Annual Report, pg. 22). Tennessee ranks 43rd in the nation for its level of maternal healthcare. This stark statistic underscores a pressing healthcare disparity that heightens the urgency for reform.
- The 2023 MMR Report reflects that over half of the pregnancy related deaths that
  occurred in Tennessee occurred between 42-365 days postpartum. Adding to the
  poignancy of this situation is the sobering fact that 84 percent of these maternal
  deaths are preventable. Let that sink in; 84% of mothers and babies who died in the
  United States died of something preventable or treatable.

## Foreword II

Black Women are *three times* more likely to experience postpartum depression and mortality than their white counterparts as 20% of postpartum deaths are due to postpartum depression.

Medical apartheid and obstetric abuse have existed within black and brown communities for over 100 years and counting as women of color are seldomly advocated for--joining the statistics of maternal mortality.

Research shows a wide range of community-based approaches could improve maternal health outcomes and patients' experiences while also potentially reducing costs. Such approaches could especially benefit those most at risk for poor outcomes, particularly people of color and those with low income. One policy option is expanding reimbursement for providers like doulas and midwives, whose care has been associated with improved maternal and infant health outcomes in some research. Other options include enhancing patient access to a broader range of services and incentivizing health systems and providers to adopt evidence-based, equity-centered models of care.



## **About Elaine Welteroth**



Elaine Welteroth, TV host, Wash Pro Columnist & Founder of the Birth Fund

Elaine Welteroth is an American journalist and editor. In 2017, Welteroth was named editor-inchief of <a href="Teen Vogue">Teen Vogue</a>, making her the second African-American in <a href="Condé Nast">Condé Nast</a> to hold such a title. Her promotion to editor at age 29 makes her the youngest in Condé Nast history to become editor. Her break in the media world came as an intern at <a href="Ebony magazine">Ebony magazine</a>, where she moved up the ranks to become beauty editor between 2008 and 2011. After a stint at <a href="Glamour magazine">Glamour magazine</a>, Welteroth joined Teen Vogue in 2012. When she became beauty director of Teen Vogue in 2012, Welteroth was the first African-American to serve in the role.

She is credited for the notable increase of Teen Vogue coverage of politics and <u>social justice</u>, encouraging readers to become civically engaged, specifically during the <u>2016 U.S. presidential election</u>. Under Welteroth's leadership of Teen Vogue's shifting format, the magazine developed its first <u>YouTube</u> channel, featuring content on diverse subjects from campus style to <u>cultural appropriation</u>. According to Condé Nast, subscriptions for Teen Vogue have increased 535% year-over-year. In 2016, Welteroth was named 47th in <u>The Root</u>'s list of 100 influential African-Americans.

In 2022 Dr. Amutah-Onukagha founded the Center for Black Maternal Health and Reproductive Justice (CBMHRJ) at Tufts University School of Medicine and is one of the first centers dedicated nationwide to addressing maternal health inequities.

A well-published author, Dr. Amutah-Onukagha has over 70 manuscripts, 6 book chapters, a best-selling book on Amazon, and a textbook on culturally responsive evaluation. Her research has also been featured across a series of platforms, including, The Lancet, TedX, USA Today, and MSNBC. She also serves on the editorial board for the Journal of Women's Health Issues. She lives in MA with her husband and two sons.

Mr. McIntyre's saveArose Foundation seeks to eliminate the systemic flaws within maternal health care. He works with the Birthing Community, members of Congress, U.S. Senators, state legislators, City Council members to put pressure on healthcare providers to do something about the high incidence of maternal mortality

Mr. McIntyre has joined with Kamala Harris, the Democratic Party's vice-presidential nominee, to raise visibility of the message on Maternal Rights for Black/Brown/ Indigenous women. He is working with a collective to bring the first-ever FreeStanding Midwifery-led Birthing Center to the Bronx, and to bring better birthing options to the community. He has also been working on community engagement programs in NYC and North Carolina to introduce programs to the youth to keep them away from gang violence and drug abuse.
